














volunteering

The New Year is always a busy time for Volunteer Centres, but 2009 broke all records for Fingal Volunteer Centre, as it did for many volunteer centres throughout the country. Between January and March 2009. 255 people registered with us. Over the same period in 2008, 112 new volunteers registered with the service. That's an increase of over 125%.

179 of those 2009 registrations continued to engage with us, with many of them finding volunteering opportunities.

Many more people have been coming to us this year due to free time, wanting to gain new skills and for work experience. We had the following feedback from Kelly:

"I was finding it difficult to find employment and volunteering provided the perfect opportunity to get out of the house and also gain experience in other sectors.

In January I started with an organisation, making home visits. I throughly enjoy the position.

Meeting new people and helping others has helped me to put aspects of my own life in perspective. I volunteer with them one evening per week.

Always on the look out for something else I often check the Fingal Volunteer website for new positions. There was a position for a forum moderator with a Dublin based charity which I took up and have been involved with for several months now.

I am grateful to the Fingal Volunteer centre for providing the opportunity to myself and others."

We hosted a number of workshops in 2009 including one aimed at those interested in volunteering on Boards. Presented by Boardmatch Ireland, the workshop aimed to demystify the workings of a Board of Directors.

For December 5th, UN International Volunteer Day, we launched a set of new leaflets explaining what volunteering is in a number of different languages including Polish, Romanian, Arabic and French. Many thanks to all our volunteers that assisted this initiative which we will expand in 2010.

volunteer involving organisations

In 2009, 101 new voluntary and community organisations registered with the Centre, well above our target of 50. This brought the total number of organisations registered to 218. These organisations registered 261 new volunteering vacancies across a whole range of categories, again well above our target of 100.

As reduced funding opportunities made itself felt throughout the voluntary and community sector, organisations increasingly spent more time exploring how to involve volunteers more in helping them achieve their objectives. While volunteers should never replace paid staff, organisations are always able to look at how to increase volunteer involvement sustainably, with some bringing in volunteers in new and exciting ways.

Our web site (www.volunteerfingal.ie) was updated to allow organisations to register directly online. This has proved to be very useful for organisations as well as us here at the Centre and more and more have been using this option. To ensure these organisations know how we operate, we've produced a document entitled "How We Work With Organisations" that sets out our services and expectations.

Our newly updated web site this year also allowed us to highlight vacancies directly on the front of the website. This has proved very useful is pushing certain vacancies and always seems to

get greater interest. And of course every couple of weeks we send out an update of all new and re-advertised vacancies to all our active volunteers. We had the following feedback from one of our organisations:

"We have had a wonderful response, lets hope we can handle them all. We usually have about eight to ten in our training, at the moment we have 22 potential volunteers and a lot more for the next training ..."

Fingal Volunteer Centre provides advice and training on good practice in volunteer management, in addition to the ad-hoc support we provide to organisations.

In 2009 we ran two very successful Volunteer Management Training Programmes. This is a 4 day modular training covers planning for volunteer involvement, recruitment & selection, support & supervision and policy development. The first module ran during the day in Blanchardstown, with the second in the evenings in Balbriggan. The feedback on these programmes has been very positive and they will be run again in 2010. 
This practical course and guidance given has helped to give me and my organisation the direction in the implementation of these vital areas.

how we work

When someone new registers with the service either in person, by phone or via our web site (www.volunteeerfingal.ie) they receive an email from us outlining how the service works and inviting them to make an appointment with us if they want. All volunteers will receive a call (or email) from us checking on how they are progressing. Once they find an opportunity we will try to keep in touch with them while they go through the application process, becoming more actively involved if necessary.

For many organisations, the time between applying and starting can take a couple of months due to applications, interviews, references, Garda vetting and induction training.

In 2010 we will be engaging our own additional volunteers to review and update all volunteers on our database on the outcomes in their cases. Volunteers will also be involved in outreach services to reach marginalised and rural groups throughout County Fingal.


